CELEBRATING 50 YEARS DURING COVID-19

Our plans to host a number of celebrations marking the first 50 years of the Six District Educational Compact screeched to a halt in March with the coronavirus outbreak. I'm proud to report that our students and teachers made a quick pivot and used technology in new ways to continue to make an impact on our six districts. Classes were held virtually, and students and teachers stayed in contact throughout the rest of the school year. New students were accepted for the 2020-2021 school year and took advantage of online "Meet the Teacher" events. You can read about other successes in this Annual Report.

When we learned there was a shortage of Personal Protective Equipment in our communities, our teachers stepped up. Supplies, including surgical masks, gowns, gloves and booties from Athletic Health Care and Fitness, Construction Technologies, Cosmetology and Health Careers Technologies programs were donated to local hospitals and other entities. Our CADET teachers **Jeff Bee** and **Troy Spear** and their students manufactured "Ear Savers" and donated them to first responders. These are just a few examples of the Compact's response to this national crisis.
