Level I Early Childhood Professions students met Tallmadge Branch Library's children's librarian, **Jill Redman**. She provided suggestions on how to make reading a fun and memorable experience for children.

Through the use of props, dress-up clothes, felt story pieces, music and puppets Redman inspired the students to reflect on their own storytelling style. The students then used her books, storytelling materials and suggestions to develop upcoming presentations for the preschool lab.

Participants said they enjoyed seeing how the children responded to the costumes and performance, which inspired the ECP students to reflect on their own reading style and techniques.



Field experiences include visits to area daycare centers, schools

In the Early Childhood Tech Prep program, students travel to different locations for field experiences.

This year, they have taken several trips to ChildScape Learn and Grow in Tallmadge, which is a daycare for infants ages 6 weeks up to children ages 12 years.

Seeing ChildScape is a great learning opportunity because students get hands-on experience observing children who have different learning abilities and needs. ECP students rotate between several classrooms to learn about the daycare's operational procedures, which include daily routines and curriculum.

In addition, ECP students traveled to Dunbar Primary School in Tallmadge to observe and work alongside the kindergarten teachers. They helped identify the educational needs of a kindergartener, which gave them insight into students enrolled in the preschool lab as they help prepare these children for their next educational step.

While in the Dunbar classrooms, ECP students had an opportunity to interact with the children by playing games, assisting with classroom learning activities and reading books. These field experiences provided insight into career opportunities that are available.

Partnering with Summit Preschool

In collaboration with Summit Preschool, which is located at the David Bacon building in Tallmadge, students have the opportunity to work with teachers **Katie Leigh** and **Jamie Aken** on a daily basis.
