Students participate and compete at state FCCLA conference

Students in the Early Childhood Professions Career-Technical Education Program attended the Ohio FCCLA State Leadership Conference at the Ohio Expo Center in April.

The State Leadership FCCLA (Family, Career, Community Leaders of America) Conference is the largest event of the year for students in Early Childhood Professions. Attendees participate in competitive events, attend leadership training, get involved with service learning, network with fellow members and advisers, and visit the college and career expo.

In Level II of the Early Childhood Professions Program, students intern at various preschools and childcare centers. These internships allow students to gain the necessary hours needed to acquire CDA's (Childhood Development Associate Credential), which allows them to have opportunities to work as directors, childcare teachers or assistants.

Our students will continue to visit Dunbar Elementary and ChildScape Learn and Grow this school year, as well as Small Steps-Big Strides Childcare, All Around Children and Absorbent Minds Montessori School in the spring.
