

Partnering with The University of Akron

Criminal Justice
College Tech Prep has
a formal partnership
with The University of
Akron. Students have the
opportunity to earn both
high school and college
credit.

In order to be eligible for Dual Credit, students must take the ACT and earn a minimum overall score of 21, including an 18 on the English portion.

First semester includes a broad introduction to the

criminal justice system. **Dr. Mary Myers**, who is a retired City of Akron police captain and an Assistant Professor of Criminal Justice at UA, teaches the course. Dr. Myers includes stories about her own experiences in 24 years of service on the Homicide and Vice Squads. In addition, Dr. Myers is a licensed psychologist with a private practice, where she specializes in psychological evaluation and treatment of emergency services personnel.

Dual Credit students participate in college courses every Monday, Wednesday and Friday using distance learning. Special technology allows students to participate in real time with their professor on the Akron campus. Periodically, Dr. Myers teaches in the Criminal Justice classroom and broadcasts out to her UA class. Students are constantly exposed to new and interesting topics in the Criminal Justice field.

On Tuesdays and Thursdays, students engage in experiential opportunities which include field trips, field experience and physical fitness activities.

Students "try" electronic GPS devices to simulate real-world situations

As part of a partnership between Criminal Justice College Tech Prep and Oriana House, several students had the opportunity to volunteer to wear electronic monitoring devices for a weekend. Founded in 1981, Oriana House is a nationally accredited community corrections and chemical dependency treatment agency located in Akron.

The ankle bracelets contained GPS units, which allowed Oriana House staffers to monitor students' location minute by minute. The units also show the speed and direction students were traveling in cars or motorcycles. One student was even "caught" speeding.

During this time, students were asked to do as much as possible to try to tamper with the electronic monitoring devices in an attempt to simulate real-world scenarios. Oriana House staffers also put strict restrictions on each student's device so that they could present their various "violations."

All of these student volunteers from Criminal Justice were involved in busy weekends and went several places," explains instructor **Shane Parker**. "One of our students went to Cedar Point. When Oriana House staff members made their presentation to our class, we were able to see very detailed information about his Cedar Point activities, including the rides he went on and how fast he was going."

Another student was tracked while marching with the band at the football game. According to Parker, "Two other students spent a lot of time trying to tamper with the bracelets using several different methods, including ice packs, heating the ankle band, and separating the ankle band from the electronic monitoring device. However, none of the students were able to successfully remove the bracelet."



Getting certified in CPR and First Aid

Students in Criminal Justice College Tech Prep have the opportunity to become certified through the American Red Cross in CPR and First Aid. Having these certificates makes students more marketable in the field of Criminal Justice.



Riding along with the Cuyahoga Falls PD
