Industry partners provide valuable shadowing opportunities

Aeronautics Careers Academy (ACA) students engage in a variety of shadowing opportunities in order to explore the wide variety of career opportunities within the field. These shadowing opportunities not only provide students with first-hand knowledge of the businesses, but they also allow students to participate in hands-on experiences to better understand the day-today roles and responsibilities of the professionals.

> Four ACA students were provided the opportunity to spend five Wednesdays at Sky Quest, a private jet charter company. Students spent full days at their headquarters at Cleveland Hopkins International Airport where they spent time with dispatchers as they created flight plans, pilots as they planned pre-flight activities and mechanics as they performed aircraft maintenance.

> Throughout the school year, two ACA students at a time volunteer at the MAPS Air Museum located at the Akron Canton Airport. Students spend five consecutive Wednesdays volunteering, where they work on a variety of different restoration projects led by MAPS adult volunteers, many of whom are retired veterans. An example of a project students have worked on this year includes the restoration of a F-7 Cutlass, a fighter jet introduced after World War II. This aircraft is one of seven known to have survived the war.

Students visit aviation maintenance program campus

Level I students traveled to Pittsburgh Institute of Aeronautics (PIA) Youngstown Campus to tour their Airframe and Powerplant program. PIA's program is a 16-month trade school where students earn their Federal Aviation Administration Airframe and Powerplant (FAA A&P) certification, making them ready to jump into a career in aviation. During our visit, we visited with two former ACA students who will be graduating from PIA in 2024. Both of these students already have jobs lined up for post-graduation, where they will be making over \$70,000 and after five years of experience could be making upwards of \$140,000!



Aurora Kubalski graduated from Stow-Munroe Falls in 2018 and is an Aeronautics Careers Academy completer. Aurora is currenting attending The Ohio State University as an Aviation-Engineering major, where she is also a full-time Blackhawk
