the program are busy caring
for the chickens, cultivating
culinary mushrooms,
planting and harvesting fresh
vegetables in the garden,
and maintaining leafy greens
and herbs in the hydroponics
lab. The goal of the program

is to teach students the skills needed to obtain a career in agriculture while also being good stewards of the environment and positive members of their community. Career opportunities include greenhouse/nursery manager, hydroponic grower, plant and soil scientist, environmental scientist, and more! Community Agriculture combats food insecurity

According to Feeding America, 12.5% of people in Summit County are food insecure. Food insecurity refers to the USDA's measure of lack of regular access to nutritional food for an active and healthy life. Community Agriculture

for Local Impact students work to address this issue every single day by donating most of what they grow to students and families in need. This year alone, almost 3,500 pounds of corn, garlic, peppers, potatoes, eggplant, okra, and more have been donated to *Cuyahoga Falls Good Neighbors*; a local food pantry. This ensures that the people who receive our donated food have options to choose from and fresh produce that won't expire as soon as they get it. The Cuyahoga Falls Fresh Farm has donated over 13,000 pounds of food to those in need since 2018.

Keeping it local by selling to area businesses

One way that our students explore careers in agriculture is by setting out to local companies to become vendors for those area businesses looking to add local produce to their menu. The students of Community Agriculture are incredibly proud and grateful for their partnerships with HiHO Brewing

Half of the profits from the sale went directly to the Community Agriculture program!
