Opioid remediation funding project

Academy of Medical Office and Business Management (AMOBM) students engage in a variety of work-based learning projects where they apply what they learn in the lab. This school year, students have been working with the City of Cuyahoga Falls to assist the city in determining the most cost-effective and beneficial use of \$315,269 in opioid settlement remediation funds. Alongside Director of Community Development **Diana Colavecchio** and Deputy Director **Mary Spaugy**, students are using their project management and financial analysis skills to develop a comprehensive proposal on how these funds should be allocated. To fully understand the scope of the project and to gain valuable insights, students networked with a variety of professionals within the community, including Cuyahoga Falls Deputy Law Director **Matthew Dickinson**, Officer **Ted Davis**, State Senator **Casey Weinstein**, Keys 2 Serenity's founder, **Brenda Ryan**, Portage County Common Pleas Assignment Commissioner **Deena Tannert**, and Summit County ADM Board Addictions Coordinator **Aubrey Lattimer** to name a few.



Medical Office students create public awareness materials

Each year, Level I students work with area businesses and local government to create publications to educate community members about the dangers of pharmaceutical waste to our environment.
